Notes regarding Peter * Peter was also called Simon (Matthew 10:2) and Cephas (John 1:42). He was called Bar-Jonah because his father was named Jonah. * He lived in Bethsaida and later Capernaum – John 1:44; Mark 1:21,29. * Peter was originally introduced to Jesus by his brother Andrew, who had been a follower of John the Baptist.

BIBLE STUDY NOTES 1 Peter 1:1-9 ===== UNLIKE the Apostle Paul, Peter wrote a general letter to all the churches in Asia minor. If we find his letter difficult to understand, it is good to remember that Peter was a humble fisherman, with not much education.

1 Peter recognizes the difficulties that Christians encounter when living in a society that opposes their values. Thus, it is highly relevant for Christians living in a modern society. However, 1 Peter does not call for disconnecting yourself from society. Neither does it counsel self-pity.

1 PETER 1: REDEMPTION. v. 1 Peter's epistles weren't written to a specific church, but to the Jewish believers in general. "Strangers" refers to the Jews who had been scattered abroad by the Diaspora. Paul was considered the apostle to the Gentiles. Peter was the apostle to the Jews. v. 2 Romans 8:29.

1 Peter 3 - ESV - Bible Reading / Study Notes

1 Peter gives persecuted Christians a powerful reminder that they have hope in the midst of their suffering. From the time of Abraham, God's people were a misunderstood minority and should expect to face hostility because they live under King Jesus' rule.

1 Peter encourages persecuted, suffering Christians ...

Moreover, the letter reflects the history and terminology of the Gospels and Acts (notably Peter's speeches). its themes and concepts reflect Peter's experiences and his associations in the period of our Lord's earthly ministry and in the apostolic age.That he was acquainted, e.g., with Paul and his letters is made clear in 2Pe 3:15-16 (see notes there); Gal 1:18; 2:1-21 and elsewhere.

1 Peter - Inductive Bible Study

In beginning our study of 1 Peter 1:6-9, note the underlying assumption Peter passes along to his reader: the saints will suffer in this life. The Scriptures are forthright, and Peter has no hesitation in saying Christians should expect to suffer. Verse 6 speaks of suffering in very general terms.
